#### **CHARTER RENEWAL CRITERIA**

#### REPORT GUIDE

LAUSD's oversight procedures are intended to balance a charter school's autonomy of operation with its accountability to the public. LAUSD utilizes a holistic, performance-based approach to evaluate all charter schools, guided principally by making decisions in the best interest of students. The CSD observes and monitors each charter school in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, LAUSD policy, memoranda of understanding, and the school's operative charter. Information gathered through oversight serves as part of the charter school's ongoing record for the District to make informed decisions about charter school authorization, renewal, material revisions, sharing of promising practices, and if need be, revocation. While LAUSD is responsible to provide oversight of its charter schools and the entities managing charter schools, the primary oversight of each charter school must first and foremost be performed by the charter school's own Governing Board. The Governing Board of a charter school has an ongoing responsibility to oversee the operations of its charter school(s), ensuring that every charter school it oversees is providing a high-quality educational program for students enrolled, is successfully fulfilling the terms of their charter, is fiscally sound, and complies with applicable laws, regulations, and court orders. In designing this document, the District has considered California charter school law, as well as the *LAUSD Policy and Procedures for Charter Schools*, California State Board of Education's criteria for evaluating charter schools, and the National Association of Charter School Authorizers' *Principles and Standards of Quality Authorizing*. This reporting tool provides guidelines and criteria used by the CSD to observe, record, assess, and reflect with the charter school on school performance as captured during the annual oversight visit process in these four categories:

<u>Student Achievement and Educational Performance</u> – demonstrating positive academic achievement and growth for all students

<u>Organizational Management, Programs, and Operations</u> – demonstrating effective leadership and implementation of the governing board's policies and procedures, as well as the school's educational program and systems and procedures for the day-to-day operations of the school

<u>Fiscal Operations</u> – demonstrating sound fiscal management, appropriate use of public funds, and compliance with regulatory requirements

This report, including the ratings in each category, is based on information and evidence gathered at the time of the annual oversight visit. The CSD considers evidence provided through CSD staff observations, document review, interviews, and discussion with school representatives and stakeholders. All charter schools are expected to prepare for the visit and have available, as applicable, all documentation requested in the *Annual Performance Based Oversight Visit Preparation Guide 2021-2022*. The "Sources of Evidence" sections below identify key information sources generally relevant to their respective indicators; these lists are not exhaustive, however, and some items may not be applicable to the grades served. Schools may present additional evidence as deemed relevant and appropriate. As needed, CSD staff also may request additional information and/or documentation prior to, during, and/or following the visit.

#### Areas of Demonstrated Strength and/or Progress

- Evaluation of school leadership documentation: The 4 Dimensions of School Leadership (Center for Educational Leadership); Director's Evaluation form with Rating Scales and Factors for Success, Los Angeles Leadership Academy Principal Evaluation Rubric, and Rubric for Evaluating Principals and Assistant Principals.
- Board Meeting June 11, 2021, agenda indicating, "Board Approval/Ratification of Compensation Comparability Study for Chief Executive Officer Position and Board Ratification/Approval of CEO Contract."

- Board report dated January 2022 included additional items such as information regarding NWEA assessments, and instructional supports. Highlights:

o Attendance at the elementary and middle school remain in the 90% and for the high school at the 88%.

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- O Suspensions were three (3) at the middle school and zero (0) at the high school.
- o After the review of the NWEA data, the school provided their Board of Directors updates of plans to provide Instructional Supports based on the data.
- o Parent engagement at the K-8 levels through Parent Square (provided 97% of parents and at the high school a 96% of parents were contacted), tracking data for parental engagement.
- The public is granted access to all documentation provided online under a link labeled "Supporting Board Meeting Documents."

Los Angeles Leadership Primary Academy's fiscal condition has been positive since the 2017-2018 fiscal year. According to the 2020-2021 independent audit report, the school had positive net assets of \$5,028,400 and net income of \$939,378. The 2021-2022 Second Interim projected positive net assets of \$5,106,445 and net income of \$78,045.	
According to Los Angeles Leadership Academy's independent audit report dated June 30, 2021, Los Angeles Leadership Primary Academy is one of two schools operated by Los Angeles Leadership Academy, both of which are currently authorized by the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD). Los Angeles Leadership Academy and its charter schools reported positive net assets of \$11,877,279 and net income of \$2,274,211. Los Angeles Leadership Academy, without its charter schools, reported positive net assets of \$9,865 and a net loss of (\$10,130). The CSD was advised that the net loss is primarily due to an adjustment in management fees to utilize prior year carryover fund balance at the CMO (Charter Management Organization) level. According to Los Angeles Leadership Academy, there are no management fees charged to either Los Angeles Leadership Primary Academy or to the other charter school that it operates. Instead, each school pays a portion of the actual expenses for administrative support, including the salaries of The Los Angeles Leadership Academy's Chief Executive Officer/Superintendent, its Director of Finance, and its Chief Operations Officer. These costs are allocated on a pro-rated basis, between the two schools based on Average Daily Attendance (ADA).

#### 1. Declining Student Enrollment:

The CSD compares charter schools' Norm Enrollment year-by-year to their petition roll-out plan or their approved student enrollment capacity in their operative charters as part of the CSD's oversight review. As summarized in the table below, the school's reported Norm Enrollment was 389, 358, 323, 322, and 318 students for Fiscal Years 2017-2018, 2018-2019, 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022, respectively, representing an accumulated decline of 71 students or 18% since Fiscal Year 2017-2018. As summarized in the table below, the school's Norm Enrollment count has been trending downwards with the school reporting losses of 31, 35, 1, and 4 students from Fiscal Years 2017-2018 through 2021-2022, respectively. Los Angeles Leadership Primary Academy reported 318 Norm Enrollment for Fiscal Year 2021-2022, representing a shortfall of 112 students (26%) below its projected student enrollment of 430 students for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 or the approved student enrollment capacity per its operative charter.

In response to the CSD's observations above, Los Angeles Leadership Academy stated: "COVID-19 pandemic presented challenges for families. The main reason for declining enrollment is gentrification and cost of living increases in the Lincoln Heights area. Due to the pandemic, the recruitment was minimal last school year. However, we are implementing our recruitment plan with fidelity this school year. We partnered with local preschools and community centers to host presentations for families with information about our programs.

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We are hosting informational nights and tours for parents and students at the school sites this year." As noted above, the school maintained a balanced budget in Fiscal Year 2020-2021, and has projected positive net income and net assets for Fiscal Year 2021-2022.

The CSD will continue to monitor the school's enrollment through oversight.

The Charter Schools Division will review the school's action plans and progress by or during the next oversight visit. The results may be factored into the school's rating for next year.

A new school would be assessed as <u>Unsatisfactory</u> [Rating of 1] based on the statements below:
6. As a practice, the governing board reviews and approves the charter school's financial reports as evidenced by the governing board meeting minutes;	
7. A signed written statement which indicates that the charter school is providing each needy pupil with one nutritionally adequate free or reduced-price meal during each school day is provided (pursuant to AB 1871 [Ed. Code § 47613.5]);	
8. The most current governing board-approved LCAP is posted on the charter school's website; and	
9. The LCAP is submitted to the appropriate agencies.
