LAUSD's oversight procedures are intended to balance a charter school's autonomy of operation with its accountability to the public. LAUSD utilizes a holistic, performance-based approach to evaluate all charter schools, guided principally by making decisions in the best interest of students. The CSD observes and monitors each charter school in accordance with applicable laws, regulations, LAUSD policy, memoranda of understanding, and the school's operative charter. Information gathered through oversight serves as part of the charter school's ongoing record for the District to make informed decisions about charter school authorization, renewal, material revisions, sharing of promising practices, and if need be, revocation. While LAUSD is responsible to provide oversight of its charter schools and the entities managing charter schools, the primary oversight of each charter school must first and foremost be performed by the charter school is own Governing Board. The Governing Board of a charter school has an ongoing responsibility to oversee the operations of its charter school(s), ensuring that every charter school it oversees is providing a high-quality educational program for students enrolled, is successfully fulfilling the terms of their charter, is fiscally sound, and complies with applicable laws, regulations, and court orders. Fiscal Operations – demonstrating sound fiscal management, appropriate use of public funds, and compliance with regulatory requirements

• LALA continues to define best strategies to support struggling students to meet the needs all students by: Providing supports such as Interventions in Math and ELA, which include but are not limited to interventions such as ALEKs, Edgenuity MyPath, Tutorly tutoring programs and accommodated daily schedules to provide interventions. Per response to CSD inquiries, the school leadership will continue to analyze data to address students' areas of need in English Language Arts and Mathematics.

Other circumstances and information could influence the rating and are noted in this evaluation.

Los Angeles Leadership Academy's fiscal condition is positive. According to the 2021-2022 independent audit report, the school had positive net assets of \$5,954,904 and a net loss of (\$894,110). The 2022-2023 Second Interim projected positive net assets of \$6,134,950 and net income of \$180,046.

According to Los Angeles Leadership Academy's independent audit report dated June 30, 2022, Los Angeles Leadership Academy is one of two schools operated by Los Angeles Leadership Academy, both of which are currently authorized by the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD). Los Angeles Leadership Academy and its charter schools reported positive net assets of \$11,094,87 and a net loss of (\$792,492). Los Angeles Leadership Academy, without its charter schools, reported positive net assets of \$0. According to Los Angeles Leadership Academy, there are no management fees charged to either Los Angeles Leadership Academy or to the other charter school that it operates. Instead, each school pays a portion of the actual expenses for administrative support, including the salaries of The Los Angeles Leadership Academy's Chief Executive Officer/Superintendent, its Director of Finance, and its Chief Operations Officer. These costs are allocated on a pro-rated basis between the two schools based on Average Daily Attendance (ADA).

** Los Angeles Leadership Academy explained regarding the net loss reported for Fiscal Year 2021-2022: "The school experienced a net loss due to multiple factors, including reduced ADA, spending of one-time funds received in prior years, and additional spending related to COVID that will hopefully be reimbursed under FEMA grant funding that is pending approval. While the FEMA grant-related expenses occurred in FY22 (covid testing expenses, etc.), the school did not recognize the FEMA revenues because the probability of approval was not known at the time of the audit report. Los Angeles Leadership Academy was scheduled to receive \$891,000 under the Hold Harmless legislation. Per auditors' advice, this revenue was not recognized in the 2021-2022 school year. This revenue will be recognized in the 2022-2023 school year."

The CSD compares charter schools' Norm Enrollment year-by-year to their petition roll-out plan or their approved student enrollment capacity in their operative charters as part of the CSD's oversight review. As summarized in the table below, the school's reported Norm Enrollment was 506, 492, 443, 421, and 390 students for Fiscal Years 2018-2019, 2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023, respectively, representing an accumulated decline of 116 students (or 22.9%) since Fiscal Year 2018-2019. As summarized in the table below, the school's Norm Enrollment count has been trending downwards with the school reporting losses of 14, 49, 22, and 31 students from Fiscal Years 2018-2019 through 2022-2023, respectively. Los Angeles Leadership Academy reported 390 Norm Enrollment for Fiscal Year 2022-2023, representing a shortfall of 160 students (29.1%) below its projected student enrollment of 550 students for Fiscal Year 2022-2023 or the approved student enrollment capacity per its operative charter.

In response to the CSD's observations above, the charter operator stated declining enrollment factors such as the COVID-19 pandemic; gentrification; and increased cost of living in the Lincoln Heights area. To improve enrollment for both the Los Angeles Leadership Academy charter schools, the charter operator stated that they are partnering with local schools and community centers to promote the school programs; hosting informational nights and tours for parents and students at the school sites; advertising their programs on various social media platforms, including Instagram, Facebook, and the school website; and creating a transition plan from 5th to 6th grade and from 8th to 9th grade which provides in-person and virtual tours and parent informational meetings. Additionally, the CSD was informed that the school's counselors are also meeting with 8th grade students to develop a four-year plan for their high school transition. The CSD will continue to monitor the school's enrollment through oversight.

2. Lack of Supporting Documentation (Check Disbursements):

Based on the CSD's review of documentation for a sample of 25 of the school's checks submitted by Los Angeles Leadership Academy on 12/5/2022, the CSD noted an employee reimbursement check that lacked sufficient supporting documentation (Check # 5905, in the amount of \$595.26, dated 4/28/2022 and made payable to a school employee). Specifically, the verification documents provided relative to this reimbursement referenced one transaction relating to a car rental on 4/9/2022 wherein the total reimbursement paid to the employee did not match the \$295.26 amount per invoice and credit card statement.

The CSD recommends that Los Angeles Leadership Academy and/or the school implement procedures to ensure that comprehensive records are reconciled, secured, and retained (before purchases are made and funds are disbursed), including supporting documentation.

The Charter Schools Division will review these issues by or during the next oversight visit. The results may be factored into the school's rating for next year.

Leadership Academy (the charter operator) \$1,047,000 in order to purchase property from Florence Crittenton Center (FCC) for \$2,096,000. As part of the purchase, the charter operator assumed the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) mortgage of \$1,049,000. Later in June 2009, the charter operator transferred title to this property back to FCC. In exchange, the charter operator received an unsecured purchase money note in the amount of \$3,000,000. The note has a term of 10 years and bears an annual interest rate of 5%, with principal and interest payable at maturity. As part of the transfer, FCC assumed the CRA mortgage for \$1,049,000. Los Angeles Leadership Academy's leadership asserted that its auditors are waiting for the paperwork from the FCC's governing board, so that the Notes Payable of \$1,049,000 would be officially removed from Los Angeles Leadership Academy's (the school) financial statements. This correction is expected to be made in the following year. The CSD will continue to follow-up with the charter operator and review the 2022-2023 audit report.
